Questions to ask the teacher



- 1. What can I do to support my child's learning at home?
- 2. What could my child do that he or she is not already doing?
- 3. Is my child taking classes to get him/her ready for future goals?
- 4. What are my child's academic strengths? What are areas that need improvement?
- 5. What is my child's current achievement level?
- 6. How does my child relate to peers and adults?
- 7. Does my child stay on task well or need frequent reminders? Has my child developed good work habits?
- 8. What kind of tests and feedback will you be giving?
- 9. How can I help at school?
- 10. Is there any information you need from me to help you better understand my child?
- 11. What tutoring or other help is available to my child should he/she need it?
- 12. How does my child behave at school?
- 13. Are there any college/career suggestions and support available?



Questions to ask your child



Typical questions asked: "How was school today?", "What did you do?", "Do you have any homework?"

Deepen the conversation by asking:

- •Questions that are pure curiosity: "Tell me more. What did you do? Who did you play with?"
- Questions that introduce a new perspective: "If I had been a new student in the class, what would I have seen?"
- •Difference questions about your child's experiences: "How was today's math class different from yesterday's? What made today's better/worse?"
- •Questions that prompt your child to talk about his or her success: "What did you do that you were proud of or that you want to remember?"
- •Questions that address your child's thoughts & feelings: "How did you feel after the test? Do you think you could have done better? Do you think you are prepared for tomorrow's classes?"
