
During the 2016-17 school year, KIRC provided \$437,011 in resources to 1,096 students within 98 Kansas school districts and 20 other schools or educational organizations.

PROFESSIONAL TRAINING IS OF HIGH QUALITY

KIRC provided three workshops and one webinar attended by a combined 277 participants from more than 25 Kansas school districts and seven educational service centers, cooperatives, or interlocals. Through these workshops, national experts provided training on the topics of Cerebral Visual Impairment, Tactile Graphics for Braille Transcribers, and Making Connections for Young Children with Sensory Loss. Overall, 90% of 174 workshop participants agreed or strongly agreed that the training was of high quality, 86% indicated they would use the content or implement practices from the training, and 83% felt equipped to transfer their learning to practice.
